REMAINING A JOURNALIST IN EMOTIONAL TIMES

The world was "supposedly" supposed to end in 2012, with the end of the Mayan calendar – at least some thought it would. But thankfully, for all of us, that didn't happen – and Alex Karpa, who was 14 at the time, was able to graduate from Immaculate Heart of Mary School. He graduated alongside 26 other classmates, including his twin sister Adrianna (see photos below).

"A bunch of us, 12 or 13 from IHMS, went to St. Paul's High School together," recalls Alex. "All my old friends are still from the school. That's neat. IHMS was the place you made friends and stuck with them. And my girlfriend also went to IHMS."

Alex is now a National Reporter with CityNews in Winnipeg and from time to time, is called upon to act as the Newsroom Producer. He began working there in March 2020. His career, however, started back in the Spring of 2018 when Catherine Ryczak, a fellow IHMS alum, told him about the Creative Communications program at Red River College that piqued Alex's interest.

"What I like about working in media is day in and day out, you don't know what the day will look like. You're learning, learning, learning," says Alex about his work. "And that makes for a unique job, the not knowing what's going to happen day to day."

Every working day in the media is a new adventure, he says, with some days being harder than others. For him, there has been

nothing harder than covering the war in Ukraine – a topic close to his heart.

"As a journalist, you need to keep your emotions in check. It's been tough, especially at the beginning (of the war) because I was being asked for translations, history, and culture, contacts, etc."



Twelve years after graduating, Alex is still very active in the Ukrainian community. He currently dances in Rusalka, plays in the Ukrainian polka band "Budmo", and sings in Hoosli with his Tato, Mark Karpa. He also attends Sts. Volodymyr and Olga Cathedral.

Alex says the reason why he is so involved in the Ukrainian community is because of IHMS and the values he was taught during his time there.

Alex fondly looks back at his time at IHMS -

discussing memories constantly with family and friends. When he was in Grade 5, he was given one of the lead roles in the Spring Ukrainian concert, and apparently things didn't go according to plan.

"I was so nervous! We didn't know, but we started the wrong scene and just went with it during the show," he laughs. "We got off stage, and Pani Stanowych, the music teacher at the time, informed us and we just did that same scene all over again."

Both the Christmas and Ukrainian concerts put together at IHMS remain in his memory and some family traditions started during those performances remain today, "Part of our Christmas tradition, after those shows, was that no matter how late it was, Dad would take us to McDonald's after." He smiles.


We asked Alex what he would have told himself in Grade 8.

"Don't be afraid to do anything! Get out of your comfort zone. Maybe I'd tell him to try harder (I was a bit of a goofball in school). The world is your oyster. Work hard, and you can do anything you want to. Don't be afraid. Go do it, and you'll never regret it."

"But it's a different world now, then when I was at IHMS. There was really no social media, I didn't have a phone."

YOUR MEMORIES OF IHMS



Sparked by this year's Back to School campaign letter, Allan Buhay ('65), a long-time friend of IHMS and the Sisters, reminisced about being among the first students to sit at new desks and attend the brand-new IHMS, even bringing copies of the first IHMS yearbooks!

With an original budget of \$200,000, IHMS was built next to St. Nicholas School, where students had a front-row seat for the exciting construction of the modern new school.

"We watched the new school being built from our classroom windows," he says. "I remember being fascinated by the plastic hoarding and construction heaters, where workers poured the concrete through the winter." Allan recalls that the new school opened on the last day of classes in June 1962, which gave staff and workers a couple of months to transfer everything from St. Nicholas before it would eventually be demolished.

"It still had the new-school smell in September," laughs Allan.

A creative youth, Allan's interest in art and design was nurtured by the Sisters, who were always on the lookout for poster competitions for him to enter.

"The first competition I entered was an antismoking campaign for the Canadian Cancer Society. Third prize!" The next, for Manitoba Education Week, garnered a silver. His third entry, for the Canadian Forestry Association's fire prevention efforts, won first prize for Manitoba and a presentation in Premier Sterling Lyon's office. "And then that poster won first prize in all of Canada, which included a trip to Ottawa with a parent."

This love of design would become Allan's professional pursuit as well. A graduate of Red River's architectural drafting program, Allan spent his career as an electrical draftsperson working on hydroelectric stations.

After spending a number of years in retirement enjoying the climate of beautiful British Columbia, Allan returned to Winnipeg to help care for his mom following his father's death. His mother would eventually live at Holy Family Home, and Allan himself

has lived at the Holy Family Home Tower since 2019.

"I applied in 2016 for an apartment, and there were 32 people ahead of me on the list!"


Living on the Holy Family campus has also rekindled other relationships.

I am so happy I did Running Club with Mr. Dedio, because it really built mental strength." Following IHMS, Darian attended St. Paul's High School, where he continued to play volleyball as his sport. He spent six years (one more than usual, thanks to COVID) as a member of the University of Winnipeg Men's Volleyball Team while completing a degree in Marketing and Communications in 2022. He became the libero on Canada's Men's National Team in 2023 – an important defensive position required to hustle and protect his teammates – and won the coveted 2023 Pan American Cup against Brazil in Guadalajara. He was recently invited to help coach Volleyball Canada's National Excellence Program, an intensive training program for grade 12 students who intend to continue their development towards the national program and/or play volleyball professionally. 
